TOWN CONDUCTS TABLETOP EXERCISE TO IMPROVE PUBLIC SAFETY

In January the Town conducted a tabletop exercise to assess how it would handle a significant flooding event. The exercise, held at the Pawlet Volunteer Fire Department's firehouse, was coordinated by Robert Morlino, Pawlet emergency management director. The scenario presented to the group of 26 participants was a flooding event with slightly more disastrous impacts than those from Tropical Storm Irene in August 2011.

Those participating included Pawlet emergency management officials, members from the Pawlet and West Pawlet volunteer fire departments and the Pawlet Highway Department, as well as representatives from the Mettawee Community School, Pawlet shelter management, Vermont State Police, American Red Cross, Vermont Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, Vermont Public Safety Answering Point (e911), Rutland Regional Planning Commission, Vermont Department of Health, Vermont Emergency Operations Center, and the Washington County, N.Y., Department of Public Safety.

The exercise simulated an extreme flooding event in March, in which several major roadways were closed or washed out. Unlike actual events post-Irene, this exercise assumed widespread power outages, presenting a greater challenge

for the response effort. Participants discussed how they would prepare for, respond to, and recover from such an event. Special attention was given to communication and coordination between different levels of responders, local, county and state, as well as the ability of the town to operate an emergency operations center during an emergency.

Several participants appreciated the opportunity to spend time with all the key players from different groups who would be working together under difficult circumstances. Results from this exercise will be incorporated into Pawlet's Emergency Operations Plan. The overall goal is to improve public safety in Pawlet.







TOWN GREEN PROJECT COMPLETED

The Town of Pawlet would like to acknowledge everyone who helped make the recent improvements to the green in Pawlet Village center.

The design for the project was done jointly by Gary Baierlein and Eric Mach. Gary was also responsible for the landscaping work and has donated perpetual maintenance of the green by his business, Baierlein Landscaping. STATE HOUSE UPDATE *John Malcolm, Representative for Pawlet, Middletown Springs, Rupert, Tinmouth and Wells*

The Legislature is in full gear as we conclude the second month of the session. Most of our work at this time happens in our committees as we take testimony, revise and deliberate on some of the 1,000 bills that have been introduced. As a full House we have voted out a campaign financing bill and a bill that makes midyear adjustments to the state's FY2014 budget.

Some of the issues that are receiving considerable attention in the StateHouse include the problems, remedies and successes of the health care exchange, the continuing discussion of the governance, funding and quality of education in the state, a bill concerning development along the shorelands of lakes and another bill proposing changes to the use value appraisal program for agricultural and forest land.

The appropriation committees are hard at work considering the Governor's proposed FY2015 spending and budget bill.

In the House Natural Resources and Energy committee, we heard from 28 witnesses as we considered adjustments to expand the state's very successful renewable energy net metering program where people can generate electricity and get credit towards their use from their utility. As the Federal solar tax credits are scheduled to expire in late 2016, we are setting up a review to design a new program to take effect in 2017. The committee is also discussing bills concerning the recycling of milk and juice containers and non rechargeable batteries.

WRITER SEEKS INFORMATION ABOUT EDWARD T. JONES, JR., OF WEST PAWLET

Edward T. Jones, Jr., was born in 1917 in West Pawlet and went to high school in Granville, New York. He was an important person whose story is being told in a forthcoming book.

A sergeant in the U.S. Army during World War II, Jones was killed and listed as Missing in Action in 1944. His remains were discovered by a German Explosive Ordnance Disposal team in Kommerscheidt, Germany, on September 24, 2008. Jones was buried in Mt. Carmel Cemetery, Middle Granville, New York, on September 25, 2010. He was returning home after being away for 66 years!

My name is Jack Wilson, and I live in Harvard, Massachusetts. My uncle, Staff Sergeant John J.

Farrell, Jr., of Arlington, Massachusetts was killed with Edward Jones, and both men were buried in the same shallow grave in Germany.


This is to request the help of the people of Pawlet and West Pawlet in learning more about Jones and his family.

TOWN HALL BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS CONTINUE


This year some major improvements have been made to Pawlet's Town Hall, including installing a fire stair on the back of the building. This latest phase of the restoration project is one of many upgrades required to use the upstairs auditorium for community events.

Installation of the fire stair was made possible by a grant from the Vermont Arts Council, with matching funds provided by the town and by many generous donations. The Town would especially like to thank The Wells Chapter of the Modern Woodmen of America, which hosted a Super Bingo event to benefit the project, with all proceeds matched by the Home Office of the Modern Woodmen.

Significant energy efficiency improvements have also been made. A vapor barrier was put down on the floor of the sub-basement, and foam sealing was applied to the basement wall. More recently the attic was insulated. This work was performed by Weatherization Works of Pawlet. Partial funding came from Neighbor-Works of Western Vermont and Efficiency Vermont.

The Town Hall has served Pawlet's town government continuously since it was built in 1881. The restoration project began in 2003 when Pawlet voters decided by a margin of 3 to 1 not to investigate the construction of a new town office building. Since then the first floor offices have been renovated, and the entire building has been made ADA-compliant. The cupola has been fully restored, and the auditorium ceiling has been stabilized.

The Town gratefully acknowledges the many contributions to this effort. Longtime resident Bill Rudkin, who died in December, will be remembered for his generosity to many community projects over the years.

VERMONT TAX FORMS NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE AND BY REQUEST

The Vermont Individual Income Tax Return Booklet for tax year 2013, which includes instructions and commonly used forms, is now online on the Vermont Department of Taxes web site, along with other Vermont tax forms. *These forms will no longer be distributed through town offices, post offices and libraries.*

Taxpayers may also to e-file their federal and state income taxes using a vendor of choice. "We encourage people to file electronically," said Mary Peterson, commissioner for the Department of Taxes. "We see a growing number of Vermont taxpayers e-filing because they are finding it is easy, convenient and secure. Taxpayers also find that they get their refunds more quickly when they e-file, as quickly as two to three days."

A number of eligible taxpayers also take advantage of free tax preparation with programs through the IRS-

Keeping Your Home Safe from Fire

Here are six simple steps that every resident of Pawlet can take today to help protect their family and property from fire.

1. Install smoke detectors and maintain them.

Having a working smoke detector cuts your chance of dying in a house fire in half. Detectors should be installed on every level of the home and outside every sleeping area. Make sure your detectors are in good working order: They must be replaced after ten years, so check the date of manufacture (usually printed on the back) every time you change the battery. If you don't know how old the detector is, replace it. If you're annoyed by frequent false alarms, move the detector to a better location instead of removing the batteries.

2. Practice home escape drills.


Having detectors to alert you to a fire is half the battle; knowing how to make a quick exit when the detector goes off is the other half. Find two ways out of every bedroom and establish a meeting place away from the home so you can be sure that everyone has gotten out safely. This is especially important for families with young children. Draw a map together and then practice your plan — a great way to help kids remember what to do when the detector goes off. Make sure everyone knows that once you get out, you must stay out. Never re-enter a burning structure under any circumstances.

3. Heat with care.

In Vermont, structure fires are often caused by heating appliances and are almost entirely preventable. Chimneys must be inspected regularly and cleaned as needed. With wood stoves, a good rule of thumb is to inspect the chimney each autumn and then after each cord of wood you burn. If you don't know how to clean and inspect a chimney, call a licensed chimney sweep. Remember that wood embers can look "out" but remain hot enough to start a fire for up to four days. Shovel your ashes into a sealed metal container and place it away from your house to cool before disposing of them.

4. Keep an extinguisher in your home.

A type "ABC" dry chemical fire extinguisher should be stored in every kitchen. A small extinguisher does not cost a lot or take up much space and can keep a minor cooking mishap from becoming a major house fire. An extinguisher is a great thing to have in every workshop or garage, too.



5. Use extension cords properly.

Extension cords should only be used on a temporary basis and should be discarded if they are damaged in any way. Extension cords should be rated for their intended use (indoor or outdoor) and meet or exceed the power needs they are being used for. Never daisy-chain or overload extension cords and power strips. A cord that is hot to the touch is a sign of imminent danger. Do not run cords through walls, ceilings or under rugs, where fraying or overheating could go unnoticed, leading to a fire.

6. Help us help you!

The West Pawlet and Pawlet fire departments stand ready to help you when you need it, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. But can we find you? Can we get to you? We rely on property owners to post their address so that it is plainly visible from the road, day or night, and not obstructed by snow, brush, or decorations. Make sure everyone in your household knows the address, especially kids, so that they can call for help if they ever need it. We also count on property owners to maintain plowed access to their property in the wintertime so that we can get a fire truck to your home.

HAYSTACK MOUNTAIN LAND CONSERVED TO PROTECT PUBLIC ACCESS

A year ago, the Friends of Haystack, a nonprofit community organization, purchased 66 acres atop Haystack Mountain in the North Pawlet Hills to protect public access and the scenic character of this well-loved landmark. Now, to ensure its work will be permanent, the group has donated a conservation easement to the Vermont Land Trust.

The conserved land includes the fully exposed summit, which has a 360-degree view of the surrounding landscape and can be reached after a brisk one-hour hike. Protection of this parcel was vital to permanently ensure recreational access to the summit.

The mountain has long been an important landmark and recreational destination for both locals and visitors from around the world. The property is

surrounded on three sides by previously protected land. These parcels include land conserved with the Vermont Housing & Conservation Board, the Vermont Land Trust, and The Nature Conservancy's 1,444-acre North Pawlet Hills Natural Area.

The Friends of Haystack credits the sellers, the Barrow Family, for being great partners in this conservation effort and for their many decades of excellent stewardship of the mountain.

The Haystack land was paid for entirely by private funds raised locally by the Friends. Costs associated with placing a Vermont Land Trust conservation easement on the land were covered by a generous bequest from the late Betsy Edwards of Dorset.






