Student Behavior Concerns

We are noticing an increase in student behaviors the last few weeks. We are working hard to have conversations with our students about our expectations, discussing what they are struggling with, and talk about a plan moving forward to avoid making the same mistakes again. Staff members are filling out a behavior form if there are issues that need to be addressed. Families will be notified if your child did something that would be considered a major (bullying, fighting/physical aggression, harassment, threatening behaviors, unsafe behaviors, disruption of learning environment, dishonesty, defiance, or leaving without permission) behavior concern. If the behavior is minor (disrespectful, disruptive, inappropriate gesture or language, non-compliance. physical contract, property misuse, teasing, or use unauthorized electronic devices) you may not be informed if it is the first time your child has done something inappropriate. If we are seeing your child struggling with being respectful or following the school expectations they may not be invited to participate in field trips or other school activities.







Health Notice for Families

5/3/2023

Dear Mettawee Families,

We have recently had cases of positive strep throat in a few of our classes. Please be aware of the below symptoms and keep your child home if they appear ill. It is important to note that symptoms can vary and a mild sore throat along with nausea and vomiting could indicate strep.

Strep throat and scarlet fever (strep throat with a rash) are caused by streptococcus bacteria.

What are the symptoms of strep throat and scarlet fever?

Symptoms may include sore throat, fever, headache, stomachache, swollen lymph nodes in neck and decreased appetite. Scarlet fever is a sandpaper-like rash that sometimes occurs in people that have strep throat. The rash is usually more prominent in the armpits and groin area. Children younger than three years with strep throat rarely have a sore throat. Most commonly, these children have a persistent nasal discharge, fever, irritability, and loss of appetite.

How is strep throat and scarlet fever spread?

Streptococcus bacteria are spread through direct contact with respiratory secretions from the nose or throat of persons who are infected. This could be person-to-person through coughing or sneezing or by sharing drinking glasses or eating utensils with someone who is infected.

How is strep throat and scarlet fever diagnosed and treated?

A health care provider makes a diagnosis of strep throat with a throat swab and test. Both illnesses are treated with antibiotics.


How do you control the spread?

Washing hands frequently and thoroughly, especially after touching nose or throat secretions. Avoid sharing personal items that may be contaminated with saliva, such as drinking cups and eating utensils. Use a sanitizing solution on shared toys and other potentially contaminated items. Cover mouth with tissue or arm when coughing or sneezing. Properly dispose of tissues containing nose and throat secretions. Children with strep throat or scarlet fever should not return to school until at least 24 hours after starting antibiotic treatment and the fever is gone.


